“ When I think about Marty Cuaycong I remember him as a young resident in his first year. Friendly, kind and really excited about the NICU. Parents loved him. In fact, one family refused to talk to the attendings and fellows and only wanted to talk to Marty! I knew then when that father told me how Marty made him feel about his triplets, Marty would be a great doctor. That father was so grateful, he invited me and Marty to his home in Cairo. Marty and I joked saying we would love to come someday. And I was so happy that Lorraine and Marty did visit Egypt soon after me albeit without the grateful father 😊.

We would talk about their travels. And great places to visit. Marty was always available and always good natured and smiling even on the toughest of shifts. I would tease him about using his watch as his calculator like the young boys I was in grammar school with and he would fess up to his nerd factor. I could always see the young boy in Marty and I think that enthusiastic spirit of youth never left him and enabled him to always be so filled with energy and robust spirit in caring for his patients and their families. All of us really loved him. I don't think one single nurse could ever utter anything negative about him or doubt him. That says a lot about who he was as a doctor and person.

I never saw Marty without that radiant smile. He continued to make an impact on the lives of so many after he left us at Cornell including my cousin's children who were in the Winthrop NICU. I never worried about their babies because I knew Marty was there. My cousin's son had a traumatic birth and start yet I knew to be calm because of Marty. Marty reassured my family who asked a million questions that our new baby would be fine and we have enjoyed our little guy for the past 5 1/2 years with Marty and the incredible staff of Winthrop to thank. Every baby was so fortunate to have him as their doctor. And I will always look at my cousin's son and think of Marty.

I was so concerned and saddened when I initially heard about the

brain tumor. I kept him in my constant prayers and asked about him frequently. When I heard he was in hospice, I prayed so much for him trying to bargain with God to give Marty more time. I cried and I don't do that for many people let alone a doctor I worked with. He had an impact on all of us. I can only imagine the pain and sadness and grief of deep loss his parents, sister and wife must be feeling. I would love to say thank you to his parents for raising such a wonderful person for all of us to treasure. I hope Lorraine is able to find his love for her daily as she embarks on the challenge of moving forward with life without her enchanting companion.

Some people have that lasting effect on your being. People like Marty are amongst them for me. In this way, I feel like Marty will live on in all the hearts and minds of those who knew him and in all the children he nourished to good health. Marty will live forever and for this, I am grateful that such a kind soul will remain with us even if we don't get to see his beautiful spirit smiling at us.
